## A New SAT for a New Generation

The new SAT will be introduced providing juniors a chance to take it for free.

Come March 2016, be prepared for the new SAT full of changes and designed for a new purpose. According to CollegeBoard, "The world needs more people who can solve problems, communicate clearly, and understand complex relationships." If you are a critical thinker, this SAT will be appealing to you. The scoring total will be minimized. The previous scoring total was out of 2,400 points, the March administration total will be 1,600 points. With the essay being optional (although some colleges will require it), the test will consist of 154 questions and the session will be three hours long. Compared to the current SAT, which is 171 questions, mandatory essay and a session of three hours and forty-five minutes.

The new SAT is split up into two main sections: English and Math. According to CollegeBoard, in the vocabulary portion of the English section, "The words are ones that students will probably encounter in college or in the workplace long after test day." Evidence, analyzing, and critical-thinking will be a crucial part on the writing section and the SAT Essay. The essay will test a student's ability to analyze the author's argument to persuade an audience. The math portion of the test will focus on problem-solving, data analysis, arithmetic and more basic math knowledge. Another note is that there will no longer be a penalty for guessing. Currently, if you get an answer wrong on the SAT, it is considered guessing, resulting in a penalty.

While the question of what hip hop artists can do to help their ‘hood’ remains, Miclette did point out that many in the panel also talked about how hip hop had “given them a voice.”




make a creative plan like this, so for a student who has other priorities and is making the time is really inspiring.




